Explain that dozens of cookies and the food items will be donated to a local food pantry. Busy women go home with an array of homebaked cookies and know that their time was well spent helping others.

and Volunteer" event and invite current and potential members. Everyone makes resolutions about what they hope to accomplish in the next year. Speakers could be on topics such as organizational skill building, financial planning, and healthy living. Be sure to include a healthy dose of food, Federation facts, and fun.

Serve varieties of coffee and chocolates, and invite a pastry chef or barista to provide a presentation to current and potential members on chocolate and coffees. 


already serving as an officer and active members.

These ladies have served the Woman's Club of Booneville in every capacity. Each having served in almost every official position and on every committee. They serve as the club's Go...To" members when information of history and direction are required.

The Woman's Club of Booneville celebrates the years of service that these ladies have devoted to our clubs.

- The annual meeting of the Mississippi Federation of Women's Clubs fifteenth convention in Hattiesburg in 1913 was delayed by the birth of Federation President Wrights' son. She introduced her four month old son to the convention. where he was hailed as the "Federation Baby".
- In 1914, the Mississippi Federation was divided into ten districts. (Note: we have only five districts today).
- * In 1915, Mrs. D. N. Hebron, the Mississippi Federation's first president, had died. Because of her contributions to the Mississippi Federation of Women's Clubs, the Federation voted at this convention that a scholarship would be given a to a Mississippi girls each year

and the scholarship would be named the Hebron Memorial Scholarship.

- * In 1920, the Mississippi Federation was re-districted into seven districts.
- In 1927, sixty new clubs had been added, making a total of 317 clubs with a membership of 10,000.
- * The 1934 convention approved the establishment of a State Headquarters and set aside \$3,000 for that purpose. The first meeting was held on June 12, 1937.



NOTES FROM THE REPORTING MEETING

1. To report your club's statistics in each of the Community Service Programs (formerly called Departments), complete one GFWC-MFWC Report Cover Sheet for Collaboration and one for Partnership for each CSP. That is all you are **required** to do for reporting. You can improve your chances of winning an award by submitting a narrative report and supporting material in each CSP.

- * Narrative reports and supporting material are limited to a two page, single-spaced narrative and three pages of supporting material. Pages should not be printed on the front and back.
- * You **must** use a Report Cover Sheet with each report. Attach the completed cover sheet to the narrative and supporting material.
- 2. Other projects are the GFWC Signature Project: Domestic Violence Prevention and Awareness, GFWC Juniors Signature Project: Advocates for Children, and the MFWC President's Special Project (PSP): Feeding Fellow Mississippians. Report club statistics for these projects on the Report Cover Sheet, using one cover sheet for each of these areas.
- 3. The two MFWC Special Emphasis, State Institutions and Mississippi Public Broadcasting, have their own report forms; however, clubs will still need to complete one Report Cover Sheet for each of these areas when submitting reports.
 - * Cross-reporting is not allowed with the exception of three areas. President's Special Project (PSP) "Feeding Fellow Mississippians" can also be reported under Home Life Collaborations, State Institutions can also be reported under Home Life Collaboration (State Hospital) or Education Collaboration (State Schools for Deaf and Blind) and Mississippi Public Broadcasting can be cross-reported under Education Collaboration.
- 4. Reports are due February 1st and should cover club activities from January 1st through December 31st of the previous year.
- 5. In order for your club's reports to be judged:
 - * Club dues must be paid by January 1st of each year
 - Reports must be postmarked on or before February 1st
- 6. Mail copies of club reports via first class mail to the following:
 - * Tammie McCoy, GFWC-MFWC President, 177 West Oxford Street, Pontotoc MS 38863. Send copies of cover sheet and narrative for each report. Do not send supporting material.
 - * Libby Everett, GFWC-MFWC Vice-President, 113 Temple Road, Petal MS 39465. Send copies of cover sheet, narrative and supporting material for each report.
 - * GFWC Department P, 1734 N Street NW, Washington DC 20036. Send copies of cover sheet and narrative for each report. Do not send supporting material.
- 7. Many forms may be downloaded from the GFWC website (www.gfwc.org) or the GFWC-MFWC website (www.gfwc-mfwc.org).

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Special Tips

* Read your guidelines. Follow the guidelines. This is what makes award-winning clubs.

- * Report everything that your clubs does if unsure where to report put in the place where it makes the most sense.
- * GFWC report form is three pages.
- * GFWC-MFWC report form is one page, but a separate one must be completed for each area in which you are reporting.
- * Advancement Areas (Special projects) are an excellent place to win awards since many people do not report in this area.
- * The number of members involved in the project cannot exceed the number of club members even if you work with another group you just have X number of members.
- * 1935 Society and 1734 Society go under Women's History and Resource Center.
- * HOBY should be reported under Leadership.
- * GFWC Clubwoman should be reported under Advancement Area Communications.
- * Feeding Fellow Mississippians should be cross-reported under Home Life Collaboration. State Institutions should be reported under Home Life Collaboration (for State Hospital) or Education Collaboration (for Schools for the Deaf and Blind). MPB should be cross-reported under Education Collaboration.
- * In order to "count" for reporting, the activity must be a club sanctioned event.
- * Remember to count in kind donations if money was not directly given.
- * Cross-reporting is not allowed. The only exceptions to this are State Institutions, Mississippi Public Broadcasting and the GFWC-MFWC President's Special Project, Feeding Fellow Mississippians.
- * Several clubs put monthly report forms for general members in their handbook and then they have a door prize drawing for those who turned in a report form for that month.
- * You may split report, i.e., funds raised, publicity, and the project but you cannot count in three places. Please make a note when you split report (for example: dollars raised reported under Fundraising).

Narrative

- * Do not get bogged down in the details give a succinct report of what happened or what you did. Give a brief description; include other groups that were included within your project. Give details about promotions that were received.
- * Remember 2 pages single spaced is the limit. Not 2 pages for each project or program.

Judging Process

- * State chairmen judge your report. Neither the GFWC-MFWC President nor GFWC-MFWC Vice President judge any reports.
- * Chairmen do not judge reports in their district that privilege is passed on to someone in another district.

RECIPES FROM THE REPORTING MEETING

Chicken Tortellini Soup

(As cooked by Lisa & Carrie Harris)

- chicken broth from one cooked chicken (may need to add additional canned chicken broth)
- chicken meat from the cooked chicken above, chopped up
- 1- large onion, chopped
- 1- large bell pepper, any color or combination of colors
- carrots, chopped very small (I buy a bag of shredded carrots and then chop about half of the bag)
- 4-5 stalks celery, chopped
- salt and pepper to taste
- Italian Seasoning to taste (start with 1 teaspoon)
- Creole Seasoning to taste (start with 1 teaspoon)
 - (be sure this does not have salt or black pepper in it, if it does reduce the amount of salt and pepper you add)
- 1 bag of 3 cheese tortellini or your choice of flavors
- 2 sticks butter/margarine
- garlic powder (abut 1 teaspoon to start with)
- 1. This is a soup that you make the amount you want by the amount of chicken broth and tortellini you use. I used 2-4 small cans of the bought chicken broth plus the broth from one large chicken. The amount of broth you use will depend on the amount of tortellini you put in the soup. Boil chicken in water (add salt and pepper to taste) until it is tender and cooked. Take out of broth and cool. Then debone the chicken and cut into bite size pieces.
- 2. Strain the broth to catch any small pieces of bone. Place broth into large soup pot.
- 3. Sauté in 1 stick of butter/margarine the onions, peppers, celery and carrots. Add to broth. Add all the seasonings (Creole seasoning, Italian or Spaghetti seasoning,) garlic powder, salt and pepper to the broth. Taste the broth to see if it is seasoned the way you want it. If not add more seasonings and butter. Add another stick of butter/margarine to broth if you want it to have a rich taste. Add the chopped chicken. Bring this mixture to a boil. Let simmer for 10-15 minutes. Taste and adjust the seasonings. Add the tortellini and let them cook for about 5-7 minutes or until the pasta can be cut with a fork. If you don't think you have enough tortellini, add another packages. Remember the tortellini are going to soak up the broth. Do not overcook or stir to much or the tortellini will come apart.
- 4. You may cook one to two days in advance but store the tortellini and broth in different containers.

Yield: Enough for a group or family



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MORE RECIPES FROM THE REPORTING MEETING

Hash Brown Potato Soup (As cooked by Sue Addy)

6-8 servings 20 minutes 5 mins prep

1/2 onion, chopped

1 tablespoon butter or oil

3 (14 ounce) cans chicken broth

1 (32 ounce) bag frozen hash browns

1 (10 1/2 ounce) can cream of celery soup (or 2 cans chicken soup)

1 (10 1/2 ounce) can cream of chicken soup

1 1/2 cups milk

1 lb Velveeta cheese

bacon bits (optional)

Add broth to roaster or soup pot, bring to boil.

Sauté onion in butter or oil until transparent.(I do it in the microwave)

Add hash browns, bring to boil.

Add soups (don't dilute) and milk, bring to boil. (Can be put in the crock pot at this point)

Add cheese and heat until cheese melts.

Optional, serve with bacon bits on top.

Note: I sometimes add Obrien Potatoes by Orlda along with the regular bag of potatoes to add color. When I use these I omit the onions. I sometimes half the recipe. Leftovers can be frozen in Ziploc bags.

5 Can Soup (As cooked by Suzanne Poynor)

1 can Bush Chili Beans

1 can Mexicorn

1 can Ro-Tel tomatoes


1 can vegetable beef soup

1 can tomato soup



Taco Soup
(As cooked by Tammie
McCoy)



3 cans rotel tomatoes

1 can mexicorn

1 can shoepeg corn

2 cans beans -- can use chili beans or black beans or your preference

2 pkgs taco seasoning

1 pkg ranch dressing mix

1 -2 cups water

- 1. Brown ground chuck,
- 2. Mix all other ingredients together in large pot.
- 3. Add cooked meat to ingredients in large pot.
- 4. Bring to a boil and then simmer for 1-2 hours.

Serve with corn chips or crackers and other condiments i.e. grated cheese and sour cream



1 (18.25 oz.) Duncan Hines Coconut Supreme cake mix 2/3 cup sugar 2/3 cup oil
1 cup sour cream
4 eggs
½ teaspoon vanilla



2lb. Dried Great Northern Beans 1 1/2 c. diced onion

1 Tbsp cooking oil

1 Tbsp ground oregano

2 tsp ground cumin

 $1 \frac{1}{2}$. tsp salt

1/2 tsp cayenne pepper

4 1/2 qt chicken broth

2 garlic cloves, minced

4 skinless chicken breasts

2 (4 oz) cans chopped green chilies

Place beans in a saucepan; cover with water and bring to a boil. Boil 2 minutes. Remove from heat. Soak 1 hour; drain and rinse cook chicken and cube. In a Durchoven, add remaining ingredients with beans and chicken and cook until beans are tender. (Simmer 1 1/2 to hours 2 hours)



Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Combine cake mix and sugar. Add oil, sour cream, eggs, and vanilla, beating for two minutes with mixer. Pour into greased and floured heavy Bundt pan and bake for 45 minutes. Do not open the oven during baking time. Place baked cake on a wire rack to cool for 10 minutes and then remove from pan to rack to finish cooling. Cake is delicious as is, but you may dust it with powdered sugar or glaze of your choice.

Glaze

1 ½ cups powdered sugar

1 - 2 Tabsp. milk

½ tsp. vanilla or coconut extract

Mix and drizzle over cooled cake.
