ENTERPRISE WOMAN'S CLUB RESPONDS To "Feeding Fellow Mississippians"

On 11/29/2011 Enterprise Woman's Club delivered 301 1# canned hams to Clarke County Association for the Needy (C.A.N.) as a project in support of our GFWC-MFWC President's Special Project "Feeding Fellow food each month. It is a Mississippians"

In September Enterprise Woman's Club president, Betty Purvis and member Susan Boyette visited with Mr. Robert volunteer agency, Clarke Rudledge, Volunteer Director

at C.A.N. to gain an understanding of what C.A.N. does and how EWC might be helpful in a way other than the \$55 donation we brought that day. It was learned that C.A.N., Inc. is a volunteer agency that provides eligible families in Clarke County with a box of member agency of The Mississippi Food Network and receives most of it's food from that source. As with any Association for the Needy

depends on donations from churches, clubs, agencies, businesses, individuals, etc. for their support. They distribute 275 to 280 boxes each month.

The information was brought back to the club, and because meat is not included in the food items distributed in the boxes it was recommended that Enterprise Woman's Club provide a 1# canned ham for each food box distributed in December. We set our goal for 300 hams at an estimated

An announcement explaining the project was sent out to all Enterprise and surrounding area churches to be included in their October 16 (World Hunger Day) bulletin. The hams need to be delivered before December 1 to be included in the first December boxes distributed. By November 28, EWC had collected 301 hams and on November 29 the 301 #1 canned hams were delivered to C.A.N.

Without the cooperation from our community this project would not have been achieved, so to them we give our thanks and God the glory.





Take a left at the red light into Eagle Ridge Golf Course and follow the road around Raymond Lake to Eagle Ridge Conference Center (the road ends in our parking lot).







The formal opening session of the Thirtyninth Annual Convention of the M. F. W. C. was held in the Confederate Memorial Hall in Greenwood, MS, Wednesday evening at eight o'clock (8:00p.m.).
