This committee will have a fundraiser once a year and shall request each member to purchase at least one item to keep or sell. This committee will also encourage members to sign up and shop at Kroger's and look for similar programs.
- Leadership The next goal is to equip our members to grow into leadership roles in their clubs, districts and on the state level. We will do this by creating pre-recorded WEBINARS and post on the website for members to view. You can show this at your meetings or have your members view at the convenience of their homes. We will also offer a LEADS workshop for a full day.
- Communication The next goal is to attempt to visit every club in our state within these next two years. Through this effort, we will build relationships, discover club needs and assist, share knowledge and encourage leadership.
- Registration With our society becoming more adapted to online purchasing, the next goal would be to investigate the possibility of offering an option to pay registration and meals for MFWC meetings and State Convention online. Many other nonprofits are moving in this direction and our own GFWC offers convenient online payment. We will see if this is feasible and cost effective for our organization.

Throughout these next two years, I encourage each club to raise funds for the American Cancer Society, the President's Special Project. All monies will be designated to stay in Mississippi. I would love to visit your club and share how this all came about. "Let's Get Wild to Finish the Fight" for that loved one in your family struggling with cancer, or in memory of the one that lost their life to this disease.

In closing, remember, in a world that says, "give up," HOPE whispers, "let's try one more time."

GFWC-MFWC Vice President Becky Wright



What an honor it is for me to serve as your GFWC-MFWC Vice President as we begin "Bringing Hope—Changing Lives!" Building off a revamped system in 2012-2014, the 2014-2016 Administration is presenting an easier and more proficient process to gather important GFWC-MFWC statistical information.

- Remember that clubs no longer report directly to GFWC.
- Our MFWC Clubs will report using our own report form that is tailored to our needs but also in accordance with the GFWC Statistical Form. Individual

reports under a cover sheet will include up to two pages single space narrative and three pages of supportive material. The club president will send all copies of cover and narrative to **Darlene C. Adams, GFWC-MFWC President, 3004 The Woods Road, Picayune, MS 39466** and all copies of cover, narrative and <u>supportive material</u> to **Becky Wright, Vice President, 81 CR 281, Banner, MS 38913.** Reports should be postmarked by February 1, 2015, for work done during 2014. Dues <u>must be paid before</u> January 1, 2015, in order to be judged.

- 3. There will be ONE GFWC chairman for each of the six GFWC Community Service Programs. However, MFWC will have a Community Service Program Chairman and a Community Service Program Partnership Chairman for each of the six GFWC Community Service Programs. There will, therefore, be a MFWC CSP Report and a Partnership report for each of the six Community Service Programs, with a compilation of the two being reported to GFWC by each MFWC CSP Chair. There will also be one chairman with one report for each of the five Advancement Areas, and the Special Projects (GFWC, MFWC and Junior Projects).
- 4. The MFWC Report Form will be two pages. Page one includes GFWC Special Projects and Community Service Programs and Partnerships. The statistics for each specific partnership will be detailed. Page two includes the GFWC Advancement Areas (5), Fundraising, and MFWC Special Projects. The cover sheet for each narrative should include only the information for that specific report.
- 5. The club president will fill out both pages to include all club report statistics, which will provide the statistics for the MFWC President to report on the GFWC Statistical Report Form. Remember that the online report form will add up the columns.
- 6. Please note that Money is described four different ways in the total on the final page. Dollars donated and in-kind donations are in Special Projects and CS Programs; Dollars spent are in Advancement Areas; and Dollars raised are in Fundraising. All are totaled separately and are each defined at the bottom of the second page.
- 7. Remember that Reporting guidelines have changed for State Chairmen. Only the GFWC President fills out a GF Statistical Form. There are two cover sheets that state chairmen should use to accompany the narratives and send to their GF Counterpart.
 - a. State Award Entry will include up to two pages describing no more than ten specific projects completed by clubs that have made the most impact on the community or club for consideration for GFWC Awards for each of the two Special Projects, one for each of the six Community Service Programs, and one for each of the six Advancement Areas. One additional page, single spaced, will describe the activities at the State Federation level initiated and organized by the state or chairman.
 - b. Club Creativity Award Entry will be a one-page narrative of the most creative project by one club for consideration for the \$50 creativity award in each of the two Special Projects, one for each of the six Community Service Programs, and one for each of the six Advancement Areas. The State Chairman is responsible for completing the cover sheet and attaching it to the narrative that she rewrites.

I am looking forward to getting wild with the new administrative changes as we fight to the finish in February!

Dues forms must be postmarked no later than **November 1** in order for your club to be recognized as an Honor Club. Clubs whose dues are not postmarked by January 1, **WILL NOT** be eligible to have reports judged or receive awards at State Convention.

to every member (whether electronically, or in the yearbook, or as a printed handout).

Proper club governance is only possible if every member knows and understands the applicable rules. In addition, regular review of your club's bylaws and standing rules is necessary to make sure that your club's practices and your rules are in conformity. If the practice and the rule are in conflict, then it is imperative for clubs to conform the practice to the rule OR change the rule to reflect the current practice. I will be happy to advise any club on the implementation/modification of bylaws and standing rules, if requested.

The histories are combined and bound in book form and placed at State Headquarters so that they will be preserved. This is a valuable tool for anyone wishing to research an individual club or MFWC in the future. It is important that every club send

in its history. Certificates will be given at State Convention to those clubs that do send in a history.

Complete the two page printable or fillable Club History Report Form available on the GFWC-MFWC website MFWC Forms page. In addition to the form, a concise narrative (no more than one page) may be added describing outstanding programs and/or projects of your club year. Do not include photographs. Please do not fold, staple, or punch holes as your actual report will be bound into the state's history book for the year.

The Club History Report Form must be postmarked by March 1 of each calendar year. Please note: if the postmark deadline for an application/form falls on a Sunday, the application/form MUST be postmarked by the prior Saturday.

In addition, there were 20 MFWC Special Projects with 7,447 volunteer hours and \$320 donated. GFWC Juniors' Special Project: Advocates for Children Lisa Beech McGloflin, Chair



The GFWC Juniors' Special Project, Advocates for Children, was adopted to give clubs statewide an opportunity to participate in projects that benefit children of all ages. Club advocates protect children by working to ensure children are protected from harmful situations, encourage healthy physical

and emotional lifestyles, and impact policy to improve children's lives.

Program and project ideas are endless, but can include addressing issues such as feeding hungry children, foster care, child passenger safety, bullying, teen violence, and increasing self-esteem. Clubs can volunteer with backpack feeding programs in local schools, support local food pantries and food banks, encourage family involvement in children's education, raise awareness about the effects of bullying, provide equipment and funding for local emergency service personnel, and support drug abuse prevention programs.

Members can volunteer at schools or day care centers by reading to children, learn about Internet safety and how social media tools affect our youth, encourage positive physical activity by volunteering with schools and parks, and learn about childhood diseases, prevention possibilities, and treatments. Clubs can educate clubmembers and others about the importance of foster care and the need for quality, professional foster parents. They can help teens who are in transition due to aging out of foster care as well as promote projects that teach teens about responsible driving habits.

To raise awareness for GFWC's child advocacy efforts, GFWC has declared the week of October 24 as GFWC Advocates for Children Week. All GFWC clubs are invited to participate by planning events related to the Juniors Special Project. Try a new project or a previously successful one. It's up to you! Consider your club's interests and community needs.

GFWC is partnering with March of Dimes again this administration. As a partner, MOD can offer unique and customized services, materials, speakers, kits, and/or additional information specifically designed for GFWC clubs. Learn about ways to promote prematurity awareness in November and to participate in the annual March for Babies walking events.

Program ideas are endless. Consider projects that help people overcome learning disabilities; support your library; promote literacy; mentor young people; and encourage lifelong learning.

Below is a comprehensive list of ideas on how clubs can support the Education Community Service Program.

- Examine the factors in your community that may affect literacy levels, such as;
 - Existence of learning disabilities
 - Prevalence of English as a second language
 - o Formal education terminated early
 - Visual difficulties or physical or mental conditions that inhibit learning
- Educate your club and community on the local and national literacy levels.
- Hold a "How to Use the Library" program for local students and English as a second language (ESL) and English as a foreign language (EFL) students.
- Offer scholarships to local high school students.
- Host events at and in conjunction with your local library and/or literary council, including sponsoring a speaker or author, holding craft sessions, or planning read aloud experiences for children.
- Celebrate library card sign-up month annually in September by encouraging community members to apply for library cards.

- Identify and recruit qualified adults as potential tutors from among club members and the community at large. Pair them with tutor training opportunities in your community.
- Recruit tutors by distributing brochures at libraries, grocery stores, malls, athletic clubs, and other
- community locations.
- Start a local book club for club members and community members,
- Apply for a GFWC Focus on Literacy Grant to fund a literacy program in your community.
- Hold a fundraiser, with proceeds benefiting the GFWC Disaster Relief-Library Replenishment Fund.

Students return from HOBY as changed leaders, equipped with advanced leadership training, self-awareness, and the motivation to make a positive difference in their community. More than 4,000 committed volunteers plan, fundraise, and produce HOBY programs. GFWC's support and volunteers have been critical to thousand of HOBY ambassadors over the decades.

Mississippi hosts a three day HOBY Leadership Seminar for high school sophomores at Millsaps College in late spring. Registration opens in September. Consider getting yourself and your club involved to provide the HOBY experience to students. This can be accomplished in a variety of ways, such as getting in touch with your local high school to sponsor a student, providing a goody bag and other support to a local attendee, inviting a sponsored student to speak at your club meeting, providing in-kind gifts, and volunteering at a HOBY event.

Making a Global Impact Across the World In our world today half of the population—over three billion people—live on less than \$2.50 a day, and 21,000 children die each day due to poverty. GFWC has always encouraged and continues to encourage clubs to reach out beyond their own communities and consider how club

Last year I had the opportunity to serve in Haiti. I worked in a clinic and saw starving children as well as parents and adults. Throughout the week we gave out so many medicines, multiple over the counter medications, that we take for granted when we have our aches and pains. I was amazed at two Ibuprofen providing relief for a woman coming in the clinic with back pain from carrying heavy sacks of rice on her head and shoulders. Daily we saw several infants and children sick with a variety of illnesses due to poverty and starvation. It was very humbling and truly a life changing experience for me. The same month I had the opportunity to go to GFWC convention in Hollywood, Florida. There I heard more information about the international partners and visited the exhibit hall where the GFWC partners were located. I visited the "Shot at Life" booth and realized my entire week in Haiti I never even thought about immunizations and what an impact that could make on the lives of Haitian children. I gathered information and learned this organization seeks to educate, connect, and empower Americans to champion vaccines in order to save children in third world countries including Haiti.

Fundraising and Development, formerly fundraising, is an old advancement area with a new name. Fundraising within all clubs is an absolute necessity if the club is to be all it can be. What is an effective leader? What strategies should effective leaders set? What essential skills should an effective leader exhibit? Well I am sure you are ready for some exact answers, but the truth is there are at least six styles of leadership. All, however, have one singular job and that is to achieve results. Each style has a unique impact on the division, team, club, or company and in turn has a direct impact on the atmosphere and cohesiveness of such.

This year in LEADS we will learn to instinctively call upon each style of leadership as we develop our skills and performance pacing ourselves to expect excellence and self-direction. We will study the emotional intelligence of self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, and social skills as we learn to use the right tools to meet the challenges presented and eloquently put them to work.

We will understand the styles of *Coercive* leaders, Authoritative leaders, Affiliative leaders, Democratic leaders, *Pacesetting* leaders, and *Coaching* leaders. Through this study we will look at the ability to draw from our own personality and character traits and sharpen the tools we already possess and develop those we have held back.

Utilizing various tools we will advance our understanding of GFWC programs and policies, parliamentary procedures, public speaking, conflict resolution, and mediation while encouraging new leadership to be responsible for greater levels of volunteerism in club membership. Legislation and Public Policy Dorothy Thomas, Chair



The Legislation and Public Policy. G-roa-n! **Don't!** This GFWC Advancement Area can be one of the easiest and handiest for Clubs to do one or more projects in and report on. If a Club has an issue it wants to work on it is virtually certain that GFWC has in place a resolution that deals with it.

Does your Club already have one or

more members who are serving as appointed or elected members in non-Club or non-Federation organizations – hospital boards, chambers of commerce, economic development organizations, parent-teacher organizations, arts organizations and so forth? Make that service count.

There are some easy ways to get a fast understanding of Legislation and Public Policy. First, go to www.gfwc.org/clubmanual. On the home page click on Advocacy in Action: Legislation and Public Policy. You will find excellent and explicit information and tips.

Second, on GFWC home page near the bottom of the left column sign up to receive mail – most of it is email – from GFWC. This includes a weekly e-newsletter – *News & Notes* – plus special invitations, announcements and alerts. From time to time, Clubs and Clubwomen will get requests to "take action" directly through GFWC in support of legislation or a petition on a subject. That is easy. Just follow the instructions. As I am writing this I have responded to a GFWC "take action" request.

Third, to go the GFWC website address listed in paragraph three above. It's the home page. At the top, click on Public Policy. In the menu that comes up click on GFWC Resolutions. In the text click on the following underlined portion: 2013-2014 GFWC Resolutions. If the Manual has been updated the dates will probably be 2014-2015. You will find a description of the GFWC resolutions that have been adopted.

Women's History and Resource Center Becky Rheinhart, Chair



The Women's History and Resource Center of the GFWC was established in 1984 in Washington, D. C. It contains historical GFWC records accessible to clubwomen, the scholarly research community, and the general public. There is a WHRC online catalog and a guide for its use provided by GFWC.

For more information on its 45,000 artifacts, it can be accessed in the GFWC Club Manual under WHRC section at

GFWC.org/WHRC or you can email the center at WHRC@GFWC.org.

How WHRC Can Help Your Club:

Need a program? Through GFWC history it can help promote interest and membership.

Does your club have a clubhouse? It can provide help with preserving historic clubhouses. It can be a professional liaison for clubs that desire to work with state and local historical agencies to preserve their records and clubhouses.

Want more info about WHRC? It publishes WHRC News, a bi-monthly newsletter for Friends of WHRC to help clubs with their historic preservation. The GFWC Headquarters in Washington, D. C. is a National Historic Landmark and has free tours for the exhibits to GFWC members.

How Can My Club Support WHRC? Join the Friends of WHRC. A form for this was given to all clubs present at the Summer Institute. This can also be downloaded off the GFWC website. Promote the WHRC to your local colleges, universities, and historical institutions. Have a WHRC chairman for your club to share the info.

Ideas To Use? Use WHRC publications and digital resources for club programs. Using GFWC historical stories, submit them to your local news outlets for Women's History Month in March, Federation Day on April 24 and for Archives Month in October. Contact your local historical groups to promote the distinguished role your club made in local history.

GFWC Awards, Contests, and Grants

Community Improvement Program Mary Edmond, Chair



The Community Improvement Project Program is the longest standing project of GFWC. Its aim is to meet the needs of individual communities as it enhances relationships between the community and the club. Many communities are unaware of the activities of GFWC and the local club. Through the project, the club's involvement

in the community will be observed with a positive outlook toward the club's activities and may seek further information regarding other projects and programs.

In considering a Community Improvement Project, a club should first determine a specific need within the community. The project should last as long as the need exists. When possible, a club should join with other organizations, such as GFWC partner organizations, professional or other membership organizations, government entities and other nonprofit organizations.

Every club can create a Community Improvement Project. Look around your community and get started! The program period is January 1, 2014, through December 31, 2015. Entries must be postmarked to the state CIP chairman by March 1, 2016. Contact me for more details and for the entry forms.

Jennie Award Tammie McCoy, Chair



What is the Jennie Award? The GFWC Jennie Award honors one clubwoman from each of the eight GFWC regions for outstanding commitment to club, community, and family. They are chosen by their clubs to compete at state and regional levels, with one from each

region to be honored at the 2016 GFWC International

Convention. This is the only national honor that recognizes individual members for personal excellence. The award is named in honor of Jane Cunningham Croly, founder of GFWC. This is an occasion to highlight extraordinary clubwomen who epitomize the spirit of independence, courage, and persistence in purpose through their roles as volunteers within their clubs, elsewhere in the community, and as members of a family or extended family.

Since this is an award for lifetime personal excellence, club presidents should consider utilizing the knowledge of club historians for Jennie Award nominees. Club presidents should be mindful of first impressions and make the nominee's packet of supporting materials as professional as possible because it may be judged at the different levels by influential community leaders.

Award rules are as follows:

- Clubs may nominate one member who has demonstrated the qualities outlined under the judging criteria for this award.
- Nominee must be a member in good standing of a GFWC club for a minimum of five years. Her tenure of service may be with several clubs. Years of service must be consecutive not concurrent.
- Current and past members of the GFWC Executive Committee are ineligible.
- Nominations should emphasize a member's entire lifetime of service.
- Clubs must complete and submit the official GFWC Jennie Award Nomination Form along with a maximum 500-word written narrative. Narratives should include descriptions of the nominee's:
 - --Club activities
 - --Participation in community groups and organizations, both volunteer and professional
 - --Commitment to her nuclear or extended family
- Clubs must submit the following supportive materials along with nomination form and narrative:
 - --Photograph of nominee (no larger than 5x7 inches)
 - --Clips of two-three newspaper (or other media) stories about successful projects to which the member contributed (it is not necessary for such articles to mention the member by name).
 - --Letter of endorsement from club president
 - --Letter of endorsement from a representative of another organization
- Nomination forms and supporting materials, including photographs, will not be returned.

Club nominations shall be submitted to GFWC-MFWC President Darlene Adams, postmarked by June 1, 2015, for state-level judging. Please adhere carefully to all guidelines when filling out applications. Photography Contests Carolyn Long, Chair



The guidelines for Photography are the same as the past administration. If in the future weeks GFWC changes or adds any items to the guidelines, the information will be passed on to you.

There are a few things I would like to stress. 1.) Make sure <u>ALL</u> the required information is neatly typed or written

and placed on the back of each entry. This will ensure the photograph is judged in the correct category. 2.) Be sure the mounting is stiff and the <u>SAME</u> size as the photograph. The edges should be smooth (not poorly cut so edges are jagged)

3.) **PLEASE** send your photograph for the calendar (one per club) directly to GFWC. It should **NOT** go to district convention. 4.) **ENCOURAGE** high school students to get involved. This will benefit the students and our state organization. Last year we had two students to enter and this year we had three. Let's work and offer guidance to our future photographers. 5.) Remember each photo **MUST** have a wavier.

This year we had a wider variety of subject matter and larger number of black and white photos. This made the job harder for the judges, but that was a good thing.

We want to send our best to GFWC - so get busy ladies. I am anxiously waiting for your photos next spring.

The same criteria will be used for state judging. General and Juniorette clubs are judged separately.

All scrapbooks and yearbooks judged First Place shall be taken by the MFWC President to the State Books Chairmen. The District Books Chairman is responsible for placing them in the President's car. She should make two lists of the books going forward, giving one to the President and keeping one for herself. All other books must be picked up at the close of the District Convention by the club.

STATE CONTEST

All entries in the State competition must be picked up at the designated time at the State Convention by the sponsoring club. If no one from the club(s) is present, the **District President** should pick up the book(s) and see that it is returned to the club(s).

Guidelines for Youth Art 2014-



District first place entries go directly to state level competition.

Classes:

A - Students receiving lessons from private

B - Students receiving instructions as part of a school curriculum with a certified art teacher

C - Students receiving no art instruction from private teacher or certified art teacher; classroom teachers giving art instruction in the classroom would fall in this category

Division 1 – Kindergarten – Grade 1 Division 2 – Grades 2 & 3 Division 3 – Grades 4, 5, & 6 Division 4 – Grades 7, 8, & 9 Divisions:

Division 5 – Grades 10, 11, & 12

Rules:

- Entries must be sponsored by an MFWC member club.
- Each club may submit two entries in each of the five 2. divisions of the three classes.
- Typewritten identification cards must be firmly 3. attached to the front and back of each entry. The label should contain the following information: Class, Division, Student's name and the complete name of the sponsoring club, city, and MFWC district. See example below.
- All work must be original, done within the last 12 4. months. Items previously entered in MFWC contests are ineligible.
- Any pastel or charcoal must be sprayed with a fixative 5. or covered with transparent material.
- Dimensions: Before matting, minimum size must be at 6. least 8-1/2 x 11 inches and maximum size must not exceed 20 x 24 inches.
- Mats and Frames: It is preferred that entries be 7. matted or attached to a firm backing. Mats should be stiff enough to stand. Cover pictures with transparent materials to protect if desired. Do not use glass.
