PLANT

- PLANT cold weather annuals Nasturtiums, Pansies, Snapdragons, English Daisies, Sweet William, and Calendulas
- Start cold weather vegetables in cold frame Broccoli, Cauliflower, Onion sets, English Peas, Kale, Carrots, Collards, Beets, Radishes, Kohlrabi, and Chinese Cabbage. Start seeds of Herbs indoors for transplant outdoors.
- **PLANT** Asparagus in prepared beds.
- February is an ideal time to **PLANT** Dogwoods. Planting site should be well drained and plants should be planted shallowly. Dogwood prefers acid soil.
- Broad-leaved Evergreens such as Magnolia, Holly, and Photinia can be **PLANT**ed at this time.
- **PLANT** new roses or move old roses soon after February 15.

TOP 7 RECYCLING FACTS TO KNOW:

- 1. Without exception, recycling is the top action society can do to simultaneously improve: the environment, the economy, sustainable manufacturing and to prevent waste from going into oceans.
- 2. Recycling is in a crisis in the U.S. due to public confusion about recycling.
- U.S. recycling levels are currently 21.4% (recent EPA funded Yale University Study).
- 4. When U.S. recycling levels reach 75% it will be the environmental and CO2 equivalent of removing 55 million cars from U.S. roads each year.
- 5. When U.S. recycling levels reach 75% it will generate 1.5 million new jobs in the U.S. (net).
- 6. Manufacturers truly want these materials back to reuse in their manufacturing, but they aren't able to reuse the materials if people don't recycle *right*.

- Recycling is a \$200 billion industry in the U.S. It generates 7-10 more job that landfills and waste to energy plant.
- Recycling conserves finite natural resources this is critical as population continues to grow exponentially.
- Recycling conserves fresh water up to 95% in the mining and manufacturing process for many materials.
- According to recent Yale University/EPA study, the U. S. recycles less that 22% of its discarded materials.
- The U.S. recycling levels have not improved in 20 years.

PICK IT UP! LITTER

- Taxpayer in Mississippi are on the hook for \$3 million a year to collect litter and debris along highway in Mississippi according to MDOT.
- In Fiscal Year 2019, MDOT spent 31,621 man hours picking up 5,051 cubic yards of trash from the medians, shoulders and interchanges of state highways and interstates.
- They got help from inmate trustee crews. MDOT used 5,930 man hours overseeing these crews, who picked up an additional 2,851 cubic yards of debris.
- In addition, citizens involved with the volunteer Adopt a Highway program, picked up 9,599 bags of debris in Fiscal Year 2018.
- Picking up roadside litter takes MDOT's approximately 1,500 maintenance workers away from more important jobs like patching potholes, striping lanes and fixing guardrails and shoulders.

PICK IT UP! COST OF LITTER CLEAN-UP IS SUBSTANTIAL IN THE U.S.

- Litter clean-up cost the U.S. more than \$11.5 billion annually, with businesses paying approximately 80%, local/state governments, schools, and other organizations picking up the remaining 20%.
 - o Direct Cost of Litter
 - States \$363 million
 - Counties \$185 million
 - Municipalities \$797 million
 - Businesses \$9.128 billion
 - Educational \$240 million
 - NGOs \$769 million
 - According to Keep America Beautiful' s latest Litter Study:
 - More than 50 billion pieces of litter are on U. S. roadway each year.
 - The majority of this trash is less than 4 inches, making it difficult to clean-up.
 - That is equivalent of 6,729 pieces of trash per mile of roadway.
 - As you may guess, tobacco products (cigarette butts and packaging) making up about 40% of this litter. Plastic and paper are the next biggest categories.
 - Roadway litter comes from both drivers and pedestrians. Drivers cause (52%), pedestrians (23%) and improperly covered truck load (16%).

PLANT

Vegetable gardens benefit the environment in many ways. Locally grown vegetables reduce carbon emissions from burning fossil fuels. No plastic packaging is required when you harvest vegetables straight from the garden, which also reduces fossil fuel inputs. Pesticide and other chemical inputs can be much less in a small, well-tended garden than even a small farm.

Planting flowers has environmental benefits. According to Project Green, plants help to remove pollutants from the air. During the process of photosynthesis, the flower's leaves absorb carbon dioxide and release oxygen. Additionally, planting flowers can help to hold soil in its proper place, reducing erosion and flooding.



WHY PLANT

- Without plants, humans and animals would have less fresh air to breathe. Through the process of photosynthesis, plants release oxygen back into the atmosphere.
- Plants are important because they provide habitats for wildlife and humans. For example, many species of birds rely on trees and shrubs for habitat, whether they live in the crevices of trees or build nest on branches. They also provide wildlife with roosting cover and shelter from predators.
- Because plants play an important role in feeding the Earth's wildlife and humans.
- About 10% of the moisture in the atmosphere is release by plants through the process of transpiration.

SIX REASONS TO PLANT TREES TO HELP THE ENVIRONMENT

- 1. Trees cleanse the air by removing excessive CO₂ from the air which is one of the most important steps we can take to fight climate change.
- 2. Trees help excess water to drain away.
- 3. Trees absorb sound. Trees absorb a fair amount of sounds. If you live near a freeway, planting a row of trees that grow close to the ground can make a huge difference. Southern magnolias grow to a height of about 80 ft. Eastern red cedar, canopied junipers, and white pine are other varieties that are good for absorbing sound.
- 4. The right tree can add value to your property. In 2010, the US Forest Service said that on average a mature tree added just over \$7,000 to the value of a property. Today, it is probably more. This is an amazing return on your investment.



- 5. Trees provide shade. In many parts of the world, heat waves and hot summers are becoming more common. So, creating a little shade in your garden is definitely a good idea and trees are particularly good at doing that. The air under a tree is typically 10 degrees lower than it is under a nearby manmade shade structure.
- 6. Trees can help to keep your power bill down. The right trees can absorb heat and can also divert wind away from your home. If you plant a canopy tree in the right place it can cast a shadow over paved areas and walls. This stops them from absorbing so much heat and keeps the air temperature a little lower. That means that you do not have to have your air-conditioning on for as long.

RECYCLING FACTS:

PLASTIC

- Five plastic bottles (PET) recycled provides enough fiber to create one square feet of carpet or enough fiber fill to fill one ski jacket.
- Americans throw away 2.5 million plastic bottles every hour.
- Recycling one ton of plastic bottles saves the equivalent energy usage of a two-person household for one year.

CANS

- Every three months, American throw enough aluminum in the landfills to build our nation's entire commercial air fleet.
- The average person has the opportunity to recycle more than 25,000 cans in a lifetime.
- Recycling a single aluminum can saves enough energy to power a TV for three hours.
- It requires 95% less energy and water to recycle a can than it does to create a can from virgin materials.

RECYCLING FACTS:

PAPER

- Americans throw away enough office paper each year to build a 12 foot high wall from Seattle to NY (a new wall every year).
- Making paper from recycled paper reduces the related contribution to air pollution by 95%.
- Recycling a stack of newspaper just 3 feet high saves one tree.
- More than 37% of the fiber used to make new paper products in the U. S. comes from recycle sources.

CARBOARD

- Recycling cardboard only takes 75% of the energy needed to make new cardboard.
- Recycling 1 ton of cardboard saves 46 gallons of oil.
- Over 90% of all products shipped in the US are shipped in corrugated boxes, which totals more than 400 billion square feet of cardboard.
- Nearly 80% of all retailers and grocers recycle their cardboard.

GLASS

- Glass can be recycled and remanufactured an infinite amount of times and never wear out.
- Making glass from recycled material cut related water pollution by 50%.
- Recycling just one glass jar saves enough electricity to light an 11 watt CFL bulb for 20 hours.
- More than 28 billion glass bottles and jars end up in landfills every year that is the equivalent of filing up two Empire State Buildings every three weeks.

PICK IT UP! LITTER

Litter has costly environmental consequences.

The environmental outcomes of litter can have economic impacts. This includes lost tourism revenues, expenses for repairing vehicles, boats and ships, restoration of ecosystems, wildlife injury, and eventually the cost to human health.
Debris may be carried by storm drains into local waterways, with potential for serious environmental contamination. Wind and weather, traffic, and animals all move litter into gutters, lawns and landscaped areas, alleyways, and parking structures.

Indirect cost of litter.

• 93% of homeowners say a littered neighborhood would decrease their assessment of a home's value and influences their decision to purchase a property. And 40% estimated that litter would reduce a home's value by 10% to 24%.



- 55% of realtors think that litter reduces property values by about 9%. 60% of property appraisers would reduce a home's value if it was littered.
- The presence of litter in a community decreases property values by a little over 7%, according to the National Association of Home Builders pricing model.

PICK IT UP! GREEN LIVING: 5 BEAUTIFUL REASON TO PICK UP LITTER

Cleaning up loose trash is one of the best ways to pitch in form your community and the environment.

- 1. Keeping it beautiful: Litter is an eyesore, plain and simple. Studies show that litter can negatively impact your sense of community and safety. When others pass you as you pick up litter, smile and say hello. It shows pride in community and encourages others to do their part, too.
- 2. Protecting children: Litter can pose health and safety risks, especially to curious children who are more likely to pick items up. Make sure you put litter in a bag or a lined trash can, and not just loosely in an unlined one. Loose trash often winds up as litter again on trash collection day.
- **3. Keeping costs down:** According to Keep America Beautiful, litter cleanups cost the U.S. \$11.5 billion a year, and that figure doesn't include indirect costs, such as decreased property values, commerce and tourism. These costs are shared by our government and by local businesses.



- 4. Preventing floods: Litter often makes its way to storm drains, where it can cause serious clogs that lead to flooding. Litter that does pass through the storm drain flows directly into nearby rivers and streams, polluting Rhode Island's beautiful waterways.
- 5. Protecting wildlife: Litter poses a threat to local wildlife when they confuse it for food or nesting materials. If litter gets into our local waterways, chances are it will eventually wind up in the ocean. Marine litter can be deadly to seabirds, sea turtles and marine mammals.
