January

- Human Trafficking Month
- Personal Self Defense Month – organize a self-defense class in your Community.

February

- Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month – organize a guest speaker for middle schoolers focusing on teen dating safety.

March

- World Sleep Day, March 13th – Sleep is something most DV victims do not get. Use this day or month to donate pillows and pillow cases to area shelters.

April

- Go Blue Day for Child Abuse Awareness on April 10th – wear blue, take pictures, and post on social media.

May

- Plant purple flowers in the town flower beds or planters.

June

- Social Media Day is June 30th – Post awareness info on your club's Facebook/Instagram or other social media platforms and encourage members to share.

July

- Hand out purple Domestic Violence Awareness ribbons or bracelets at July 4th celebrations.

August

- Back-to-school supply drive to be donated to local shelters or families affected by domestic violence.

September

- World Peace Day is September 21st – World Peace Day display purple pinwheels around your town.

October

- Purple Thursday – Wear purple each Thursday in October to show support for Domestic Violence victims.
- Make-a-Difference Meetings – during club meetings, write short notes of encouragement to be given to victims at the shelter.
- Sock-tober – collect socks (adult & children) for Domestic Violence Shelters.

November

- World Kindness Day is November 13th – Partner with area Law Enforcement to donate small stuffed animals for children they come into contact with due to Domestic Violence calls.

December

- Toy Drive for Domestic Violence Shelters.
- Decorate a town Christmas tree in purple in memory or honor of Domestic Violence victims.
- Write Christmas cards for shelters.
