MFWC FACTS

- * The Federation had supported the building of libraries since its inception, and during the 1920's it was instrumental in the creation of the Mississippi Library Commission.
- * The Forestry Commission was also created during the 1920's. The Federation had long sought the creation of this body.
- * In 1920, the Mississippi Federation was re-districted into seven districts.
- * In 1934, the Mississippi Federation was re-districted again into six districts.
- * The first "Summer Institute" was held at Belhaven College on July 17-18, 1935.
- * In 1937, the Federation, working with the Research Club of Jackson, funded the purchase of two iron lungs for the treatment of polio victims.
- * 1938, Mississippi received nation recognition by placing second in the

IMPORTANT PHOTOGRAPHY CONTEST UPDATES

In response to member feedback, we (GFWC) recently updated the Photography Contests section (page 25-31) of the Awards, Contests and Grants guide in the 2010-2012 *GFWC Club Manual*—found at

www.GFWC.org/GFWCMembers—to clarify a few contest rules. Below are the revisions that were made:

1. **Photo format.** Photo submissions for all three photography contests must be submitted in a print format.

If you have a digital photo you wish to submit, please submit a high-quality print of it.

2. **Photo size.** The photo size of the entry for the A Year in Pictures Photography Contest must be at least 10 x 12 inches, but no larger than 14 x 16 inches.

3. **Photo markings.** For all three photography contests, please do not mark any information on the back of the photo, including contact information or an arrow pointing to the top, as this can damage the photo. Instead, please submit a separate sheet of paper with the photo-

tographer's contact information, name of the sponsoring club, and State Federation, a brief caption providing the location and other notes about the photo, and the photo title.

4. **Photo matting.** Please do not submit matted photos, as this makes scanning them difficult on our end.
5. **Contest year clarification.** As a clarification, a "contest year" always runs from May of the previous year to May of the year that the contest awards are given. This year's contest year is May 2010-May 2011.

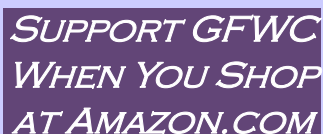

RALEIGH WOMAN'S CLUB CELEBRATES 80TH ANNIVERSARY

The beautifully decorated fellowship hall of Raleigh United Methodist Church was the setting for the celebration of the 80th birthday of Raleigh Woman's Club on March 3, 2011. Tables covered with white table cloths, green velvet ribbon and white roses greeted members and guests when they entered. Green and white are the club's signature colors and the club flower is the white rose.

Lisa Harris, Club President, welcomed everyone and Willie Grace Myatt led in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance. Rev. Dianne Harms, pastor of Raleigh United Methodist Church, gave the Invocation. Judy T. Martin read a Proclamation from the town of Raleigh, commending the club for the work it has done for the betterment of the community and town for the past eighty years.

Mary Edmond shared some of the history of The Raleigh Woman's Club. Facts were gleaned

from club records, but also from conversations she had with Mrs. Vera Martin, one of the club's earliest members. "March 18, 1931, was a cold and windy day", began the story of the beginning of Raleigh Woman's Club. Fourteen women met in the home of Mrs. Allen Caughman to form an organization that would grow and serve the community for the next eighty years. We were reminded that in 1931, America was still in the midst of the Great Depression. The club adopted the motto, "A Better Raleigh", and that is still what the club works toward today. Mrs. B. W. Ware was elected as the first club president. The club and individual members were involved in many activities, including The Heart Fund, T.B. Drives, Cancer Fund, Red Cross, Blood Banks, Whitfield, clean-up campaigns, and – even a rat extermination campaign in the winter of 1935!

The club organized the Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Little League Baseball and the Summer Reading Program. It sponsored fund-

raising projects to buy material to build what we now know as the Vera Martin Community Center, which was built with W.P.A. (Work Progress Authority) labor. The library has always been an important club project. It began with just two dozen books, in the back room of a grocery store, and progressed to the library we enjoy today.

Dresses, hats and gloves were the appropriate attire for club meetings. Officers sat at a head table and refreshments were served on fine china with silverware. Meetings were held in member's homes. Many things have changed since then, but one thing has not. That is the club mission. We honor and pay tribute to those fourteen ladies, along with Mrs. Vera, and the members that followed. They set an example of service that members of today and the future will strive to achieve.

Dr. Tammie McCoy, State President of GFWC-MFWC, Inc., honored two club women with outstanding records of service to Raleigh Woman's Club. Nicki Yeager was presented a certificate for fifty-four years and Vivien Corley for seventy years as club member.

Members and guests enjoyed wonderful food, beautifully displayed and served. All the while, Nada Tullos was providing a feast for the ears with her golden harp. Various awards earned by the club were displayed, as well as pictures and programs from years past. Several club year books were on display.

In her closing remarks, Club President, Lisa Harris, told of the awards the club had won at the District V Convention, held in Star, MS, the day before. We were especially proud to have been named "Club of the Year 2010", and Lisa

was honored as "District V Club Woman of the Year".

As is always the case, no event such as this can be successful without the hard work and cooperation of all involved. We especially want to thank our committee chairmen. They are: Nada Tullos - music; Carrie Harris and Flora Headrick - food; Carolyn Ainsworth, Shelia Bryant and Mary Edmond, decorations.

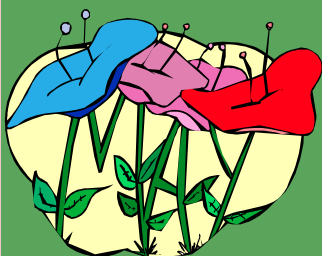

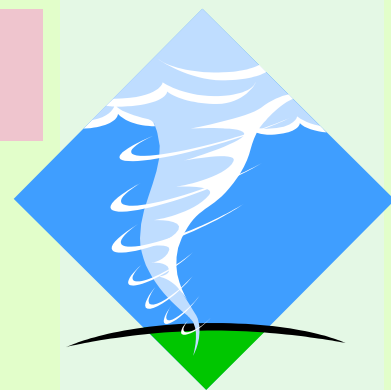

**EDUCATION -PARTNERSHIPS
WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW**

Dear Fellow MFWC Clubwomen,

First of all, I want to say how much I truly enjoyed reading all of the partnership reports on "Judging Day" in February. I am so awed by the work that the ladies of MFWC across the state do! I loved seeing not only the massive volunteer efforts going on across our state, but seeing the number of programs and projects that were initiated by GFWC-MFWC Clubwomen like you!

I know that will all of the confusion and changes in partnerships last year, reporting was a little daunting. We hope that these suggestions will help with your record-keeping and reporting endeavors. And, as good as our first year with the new GFWC partnerships was, I KNOW we can do better... now that we understand what our partnerships are and how we can serve to earn hours under those partnerships. I

just want to remind everyone again of our partnerships and just suggest a few ideas for those partnerships.



**Partnerships
in Education**

American Library Association (ALA)

Visit the ALA's website at www.ala.org. There are so many wonderful resources on this website. There are printable fact sheets and brochures that you can print to share information about the ALA with your club members or with the public. There are also webinars and podcasts that your club members can view. Make plans now for your club to participate in Virtual Library Legislative Week, May 9-13. There is a short survey to complete to

pledge how your club plans to participate: write, call, or email to your leaders in congress to help support our libraries. Add "Banned Books Week" to your club's calendar for September 24-October 1. Use the time beforehand to compile a list of books that have been banned from libraries for various reasons. Everyone read a book on the list and give a brief review at your October club meeting.

Mentoring USA

Although Mississippi does not have a Mentoring USA site, your club can still earn hours with this partnership through donations to Mentoring USA and by educating your members and the public about this organization. Go to the Mentoring USA website www.mentoringUSA.org and utilize the resources there to help with mentoring programs that you already have in place or use concepts there to start your own local program.

Reading Rockets

I cannot say enough

about the boundless resources, ideas, and events that are on this website. Check them out at www.readingrockets.org! Focus on literacy at your club meetings and watch a video on literacy from this website, or use other virtual resources to “meet” authors. Use parent guides from this website to give to parents in your “Books for Babies” program or share them with a local school. View episodes from the Reading Rockets/WETA Public Television library online; use their Literacy Calendar to focus on certain events/issues at your club meetings. Honestly, there are countless ways for your club to get involved with Reading Rockets.

Please remember, to earn hours with our GFWC Education Partnerships, we may not always be directly involved by giving a donation; think outside of the box and utilize the resources that are available from the partnerships. While donating is definitely one very vital way to get involved, not all clubs have the financial resources to donate, or they would rather keep

those resources local. One very big responsibility of GFWC women is to raise awareness about the causes and organizations that we support. Your club can earn hours by educating themselves and others about these partnerships.

- * Print ready-made resources/brochures from these websites to share information about these organizations with your club members and your community.

- * At your next meeting, set up a computer and watch one of the videos about one of the partnerships. If no one in your club is “computer-savvy” enough to do this, this is a great opportunity to get to know your local library staff or even a local school’s technology students.

- * Host a “reading night” at a local school or pre-school: read a story, provide refreshments, and have parent resources (How to Help Struggling Readers, Learning to Read,

etc.) on hand to share with parents.

- * Adopt a classroom, purchase and donate books and other literacy materials from the Reading Rockets store.

- * Have a librarian that is a member of ALA come and speak to your club about ALA, why she is a member, its importance, and how she uses resources from ALA.

- * Look for opportunities to support these organizations through legislative actions. There is almost always some type of legislative action in the works regarding our public libraries, school libraries, or literacy education.

- * Many of these organizations have free materials that they can send out to civic organizations. Email, write, or call these partnerships to see what they have to offer.

Check out the websites and sign up for email alerts. These partnerships

will send you emails about upcoming events, special focuses, and general publicity items. These are great ways for your club to keep abreast of what is going on with these partnerships. (And it’s free!)

These are just a few suggestions of ways that your club can get involved with our GFWC Education Partnerships! Please share ways that your club has earned hours with our partnerships; I would love new ideas to share with other clubs! REPORT! REPORT! REPORT! 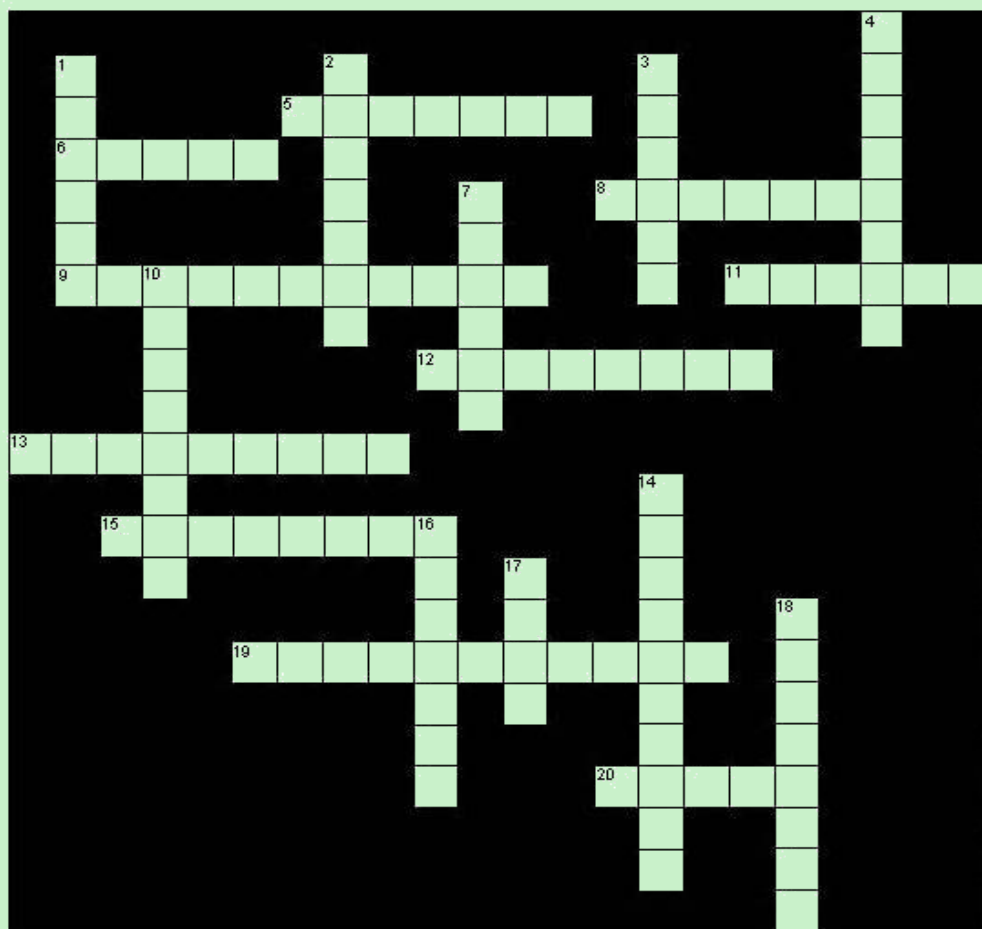
