

MFWC Facts

Taken from "A History of the Mississippi Federation of Women's Clubs" 1898 - 1998

Administration of Mrs. J. C. Hardy 1922 - 1924

• Thirteenth President of MFWC from Gulfport, MS

Highlights of this Administration

- ♥ During Mrs. Hardy's administration much progress was made in many areas:
 - Club expansion was stressed with forty two new clubs added
 - Registration of women voters was stressed through the Citizenship Department
 - Fostering Library movements was a priority for the Literature Department
 - The Home Economics Department working with other state agencies reported that one hundred sixty seven schools in Mississippi had Home Economics Departments.
- ▼ Mrs. Hardy had the honor of presiding at the Silver Jubilee convention held in Grenada in 1923. At the time of this convention, the Federation had approximately two hundred clubs and a total membership of 7,000 women.
- ▶ Because it was the Silver Jubilee, this convention lent itself to historical reminiscences. A Pageant of presidents, honoring past Federation presidents, was very well received. This tradition continues today at each annual convention. The convention program consisted of a grand march, reports of club and district presidents, introduction of honor clubs and awards of honor in Literature and Club Extension.
- ▶ In addition to the festivities of this convention, some resolutions that dealt with important issues were adopted. One of the resolutions called for the passage of a law that required a medical examination for men and women before marriage. A protest was filed with the U. S. Agricultural Department against its plan to change the name of "Home Economics work" to "Home Extension work". This protest also voiced opposition to the department's policy of making women's work subordinate to men's.
- ▼ The twenty sixth annual convention of the Federation was held in Jackson in the Spring of 1924 and was attended by five hundred women. The only political action taken at this meeting was in the form of a resolution instructing local clubs to assist actively in the election of beat and county delegates to the state and national conventions who were pledged to law enforcement. Other resolutions endorsed the selection of women jurors, the enlarging of the Hebron Memorial Scholarship, the passage of an anti-prostitution law, and increased appropriations for Mississippi State College for Women.

Interested GFWC-MFWC members must first pass through the ESO pledge stage before they can become ESO members. The completion of an ESO pledge application is needed before a

pledge can begin working towards membership status. The pledge application must be sent to the MFWC ESO chairman—Donna Hutchings, who will begin tracking the pledge's progress. A pledge qualifies for membership at her own pace, finishing in a few weeks or working slowly throughout a longer period of time. After proper completion of 16 books, the pledge receives a certificate verifying her ESO membership.

In addition to the President's Reading Challenge, there are many opportunities for ESO members to work their way up through the ESO levels. Clubwomen move to a new ESO level by completing a set of reading list requirements. The reading list is divided into subject categories. To complete a category, a member must read and report on four (4) books from that category.


ESO Levels

- Pledge: A Pledge has obtained an enrollment application and has started to fulfill the reading requirements.
- Member: A Member has completed four books from four different categories, for a total of 16 books. She is then eligible to wear the ESO pin and receive a membership certificate.

I believe this will be a great way to encourage and include other members, possibly being an avenue that would entice potential recruits into joining our Federation.

According to a new study of hospital patients in Massachusetts, 1 out of 5 people who have a heart attack are 40 or younger, and the rate of heart attacks in those under 40 has risen 2 percent a year for 10 years. The One Hundred Twenty-First Annual Convention of the GFWC-Mississippi Federation of Women's Clubs, Inc., will be held in Starkville, Mississippi, Thursday - Saturday, April 25th – 27th, 2019.

Deadlines . . .

The deadline for hotel reservations was April 5th to be included in the reserved block of rooms at the Courtyard Starkville at the Mill Conference Center. Registration for the convention and meals is April 15, 2019. A copy of the Official Call to Convention which includes Meal Reservation form and Credential Cards can be found in the Spring issue of the Mississippi Clubwoman magazine or on our website at https://www.gfwc-mfwc.org/GFWC_MFWC_Official_Calls.html.

What to bring with you . . .

Clubs are asked to bring their "Life Is Why" Brag board and money raised for the President's Special Project: Mississippi Chapter of the American Heart Association. Clubwomen may wish to bring items for the New to You sale that will benefit the President's Special Project.

Checking In . . .

All members and guests attending the convention must be registered before attending the convention. Upon your arrival at the Convention, stop by the registration table in the Grand Foyer at the Mill to pick up your convention packet.

Exhibits and Exhibits Room...

Please make time to view our exhibits room to see our photography, youth art and challenge youth art entries and who won what. You can also view yearbook and scrapbook submitted by clubs and possibly get some new ideas for your club's yearbook or scrapbook. Reminder - the exhibit room will close at 5:00 p.m. on Friday, April 26th. All entries MUST BE PICKED UP between 5:00 and 5:30 p.m. on Friday. Clubs are completely responsible for retrieving entries from the exhibit room.

Representation . . .

The Voting Body shall consist of the General Officers; Appointed Officers; Past State Presidents; State Chairmen of Standing Committees, Special Committees and Community Service Programs; District Officers and Chairmen, corresponding with those of the State; and, regularly accredited Club delegates. Voting delegates shall wear a special designation on their name badges. Each Federation Club of fifteen (15) members or less shall be entitled to representation by the President or her appointee and one elected delegate. For each additional membership of fifteen (15) or major fraction thereof, a club shall be allowed another delegate. Be sure that you have registered as a voting delegate and have you voting delegate cards on hand at all times.

Resolutions . . .

Emergency resolutions may be presented to the Resolutions Committee. All other resolutions must be submitted in advance, pursuant to Article IX, Section 9 of the GFWC-MFWC Bylaws. An emergency resolution is one arising from a sudden condition calling for immediate action, which because of its nature could not have been submitted at the designated time.

121st GFWC-MFWC State Convention - The Facts

Proposed Amendment...

The proposed amendment has been approved by the GFWC-MFWC Executive Board and will be voted on at the 121st State Convention.

GFWC- Mississippi Federation of Women's Clubs, Inc. Bylaws

ARTICLE IX - STANDING COMMITTEES

Section 10. State Headquarters Committee

The bylaws committee recommends that Section 10. State Headquarters Committee A. be revised:

To insert **at least** after the word **and** before the word **one** in the third sentence of this section.

Current Verbiage:

A. This Committee shall be composed of eleven (11) members. The President, the Presidentelect and the Vice President shall be ex-officio members of this Committee. The remaining members shall be as follows: one from the State at large, one from the Jackson area, **and one** from each of the Districts.

If adopted would read:

A. This Committee shall be composed of eleven (11) members. The President, the Presidentelect and the Vice President shall be ex-officio members of this Committee. The remaining members shall be as follows: one from the State at large, one from the Jackson area, and <u>at</u> <u>least</u> one from each of the Districts.

Rationale:

To clarify membership after redistricting in 2018.

According to:

GFWC- Mississippi Federation of Women's Clubs Bylaws ARTICLE XIII - AMENDMENTS

These bylaws may be amended at any State Convention by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting, provided the proposed amendment (or amendments) has been approved by the Executive Board and has been appended to the Call to Convention, or by a three-fourths vote of those present and voting, without prior notice.

1902, curious crowds from all around made their way to the tiny city of Boardtown to get their first glimpse of electric lights. Fast-forward to 2015, nearly 50 years after the last thread of "Starkville Chambray" was produced, and The Mill at MSU re-opened with the same excitement and promise as more than 100 years before.

Peruse our full timeline for our historic tale.

1902

In the early days of the cotton mill, people came from all over not for the high-grade fabric being produced, but to catch a glimpse of something they'd never seen in action: electricity. The lights of the mill shining each night were symbolic of what the building would come to mean to the city of Starkville: a tiny dot on the map named Boardtown that was unaware of the journey it had just begun.

1916

Few things were as important to the cotton mill and to the city as the moment J.W. Sanders decided to buy Starkville's mill and make it part of Sanders Industries. Under his guidance, the mill became one of the most successful of its kind across the country and was an economic driver in both the city and the state. The Sanders family proved to be among Mississippi's most powerful and influential groups.

1928

After over a decade of success, Sanders made the decision to expand the cotton mill and increase production to meet the booming demand for their signature "Starkville Chambray" thread. By the time expansion was complete, the mill was producing the Chambray at a rate of 1.5 million yards annually, one of the largest providers in the United States.

1937

Following his father's passing, then-G.M. Robert David Sanders took over Sanders Industries, beginning an even greater expansion in the work and influence of his family's company. With the younger Sanders at the helm, the company began producing clothing and assorted items made from the Starkville Chambray, and it was his campaign "What Mississippi Makes, Makes Mississippi" that helped change perceptions of the growing industrial state.

1947

When World War II hit the country, demand for fabric grew to an all-time high. By the time the war concluded, the cotton mill was producing 160,000 yards of fabric per week, running 24 hours a day on

three eight-hour shifts. The mill had become the center of town with its own community of houses surrounding the area, complete with a church, hospital, school, weekly meat market and even a fire station run out of the tower seen today at the front of the building.

1965

After 60 years of a mutually beneficial relationship between school and mill, Mississippi State University bought the recently-closed cotton mill and re-named it the Cooley Building, home to the school's physical plant. For decades MSU had been a pipeline of trained workers for the mill, making it fitting for the university to save the building and keep it intact for its soon-to-be-realized future.

2015

Over a century after the cotton mill first opened in Boardtown, The Mill re-opened in Starkville to once again take its place as the city's economic hub, a center of commerce and community re-shaping the town and ushering it onward just like it did 100 years before. The cotton mill then and The Mill at MSU now both represent a gateway to the university and a bridge to the community.





GFWC 7 Grand Initiatives

National Arbor Day

Goal: That clubmembers will plant 1,000 trees before June 2020

Background on National Arbor Day.

The origin of Arbor Day dates back to the early 1870s in Nebraska City, Nebraska. A journalist by the name of Julius Sterling Morton moved to the state with his wife, Caroline, in 1854 (a little more than 10 years after Nebraska gained its statehood in 1867). As newcomers to the young state, the couple purchased 160 acres in Nebraska City and planted a wide variety of trees and shrubs in what was primarily a flat stretch of desolate plain.

Morton also became the editor of the state's first newspaper, Nebraska City News, which became a perfect platform for Morton to spread his knowledge of trees and to stress their ecological importance within Nebraska. His message of tree life resonated with Nebraskans, many of whom recognized the lack of forestation in their community. Morton also became involved with the Nebraska Board of Agriculture.


On January 7, 1872, Morton proposed a day that would encourage all Nebraskans to plant trees in their community. The agriculture board agreed, and after some back-and-forth about the title - the event was originally going to be called "Sylvan Day" in reference to forest trees. However, Morton noted that the day should reflect the appreciation of all trees and Arbor Day was born.

It wasn't until 1970, however, that Arbor Day became recognized nationwide, thanks to Richard Nixon. This move was in line with other environmentally-friendly actions taken by Nixon in the 1970s, including the passing of the Clean Air Act, the Endangered Species Act, the Clean Water Act and the National Environmental Protection Act, along with the creation of the Environmental Protection Agency.

Be part of GFWC clubs planting 1,000 trees on Arbor Day, Friday, April 26, 2019, and Friday, April 24, 2020.

- Obtain free trees by joining the National Arbor Day Foundation.,
- Request trees from the National Wildlife Federation Trees for Wildlife program,
- Purchase trees from a local nursery or organizations such as a scout group and plant them.,
- Contact your local SWCD or NRCS and ask about their tree sales.

National Arbor Day Done Mississippi Style

As part of one of GFWC President Brock's Grand Initiatives, at her request, we will take our HEARTS for a walk to the nearby George Evans Park and plant a tree to leave a piece of our heart in Starkville for future generations.

We will then skip back over to the Marriott —possibly making a quick stop for retail therapy as we pass opportunities on the way— and prepare for the Friday Night Banquet.


When we plant a tree we make a difference:

- Trees improve air quality by producing oxygen. They also store carbon, offsetting harmful byproducts of fossil-fuel burning. The average tree can clean up to 48 pounds of carbon dioxide annually.
- They moderate the effects of sun and wind, and they clean the air by trapping dust, pollen and other pollutants.
- Planted in the right places around buildings, trees can significantly reduce air-conditioning costs. This means less Freon, an inflammable and odorless chemical emitted from air conditioners. It is considered to have damaging effects to the ozone layer.
- Trees generate jobs and contribute raw materials for buildings, newspapers, books, etc. They are renewable, biodegradable and recyclable.
- They provide shelter and food for wildlife such as birds, squirrels and bugs. Fruit trees provide delicious and free supplemental nutrition for wildlife and humans.
- Trees make people feel good. Workers are more productive when they see trees along their commute routes and from their office windows. Studies show that neighborhoods with significant greenery report fewer instances of crime and less insecurity, resulting from a greater sense of community.
- Landscapes that include trees help relax us, lower HEART rates and REDUCE stress.

Weather


