




Carolyn Tedford Vice President and Dean of Chairman

A couple of tidbits to assist you and your club to start preparing now for reporting are listed below:

- Most of us keep our schedule on some type of calendar. When you participate in an event notate on your calendar the time spent preparing for and participating in the event. Notate money spent and in-kind donations, and any other information you will need to turn into the club for reporting purposes.
- If you are a club chairman for an event or activity, go ahead and write up a report including time, donations, and supporting documents immediately after the event.

I hope y'all are doing well and thank you for all your Dues Forms! Speaking of Dues Forms, I would like to take time to touch on some points concerning dues. As your MFWC Treasurer, I send our membership dues in to GFWC in mid February each year; therefore, we collect our club dues in the preceding months. For your club to obtain Honor Club Status, your dues must be postmarked by **November 1**. To qualify to have your club reports judged or to receive rewards, your dues must be postmarked by **January 1**. Now, having said this, you can certainly send in dues later, but please be as prompt as possible, because your MFWC Treasurer must get her report in to GFWC by **February 1**.

You do not have to wait until every potential member has paid their dues to send them in to me. If it's getting close to these deadlines, and a few haven't paid, go ahead and send in what you have and the rest when you get them. Just be sure your roster only includes the ones who have paid. Then add the others when you send in their dues.

As to new members joining in the spring, your club can prorate their portion of dues, but they still need to pay the \$30 for General Membership (\$15 for MFWC & \$15 for GFWC) and \$25 for Juniorette Members (\$15 for MFWC & \$10 for GFWC). These can be sent in at any time with an updated club roster. I will send in an updated Membership Report to GFWC at the end of the fiscal year in May and pay any new membership dues then.

I hope this is clearer than mud! If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact me! It's never too late or the wrong time to send in donations, so keep them coming! Cheerfully sent from your "Blooming" Treasurer!


At District level, she has served as President-elect and currently serves as Southern District President. She was named District Clubwoman of the Year in 2017.

March is a great time for your club to do a nutrition project as it is **National Nutrition Month!**

This theme for 2022 is "Celebrate a World of Flavors". These themes will help you to celebrate all month long!

Week 1: Eat a Variety of Nutritious Foods. Include healthful foods from all food groups. Learn how to read Nutrition Facts labels. Incorporate your favorite cultural foods and traditions.

Week 2: See a Registered Dietitian Nutritionist (RDN)
Ask your doctor for a referral to an RDN.
Find an RDN who specializes in your unique needs.
Receive personalized nutrition information to meet your health goals.

Week 3: Plan Your Meals and Snacks Choose healthful recipes to make during the week. Use a grocery list to shop for nutritious foods. Make healthful food and drink choices when away from home.

Week 4: Create Tasty Foods at Home. Learn cooking and meal preparation skills. Try new flavors and foods from around the world. Enjoy your meals with friends or family, when possible.

Other ideas would be to host a healthy cooking demonstration or a healthy food drive and provide these nutrition information sheets at your event!

May is **National Physical Fitness and Sports Month**.

- Adopt a classroom and donate physical exercise "take a break" items such as jump ropes, activity dice, hula hoops, Koosh balls, and other recreation equipment.
- Partner with a local assisted living home to provide senior exercise equipment such as leg pedaling machines, resistance bands, and yoga mats, or to support their exercise program in other ways.

May is **High Blood Pressure Education Month** and **Stroke Awareness Month**.

The Division for Heart Disease and Stroke Prevention (DHDSP) put together a Hypertension Communications Kit to help us to better educate the public about the risks of hypertension and it includes social media messages, graphics, and so many great printable resources! Citizenship

GFWC-MFWC Raleigh Woman's Club (MS) continued with their "Youth Booster Club Program" in 2020 to promote student volunteer opportunities for the community because there are no other groups willing to work with our youth in Smith County. Most of our community volunteer groups have aged out or shut down. The Raleigh Woman's club has taken upon themselves to track and certify the community service hours of our Smith County youth. This certification documents students' proof of hours served as volunteers for scholarship applications, school requirements, Boy and Girl Scout badge requirements and various other requirements. RWC members supported community youth programs as volunteer chaperons, providing transportation. water and snacks, coaching baseball teams, operating concession stand, donating canned goods for youth food drive, sponsorship for youth band, tennis, softball & cheerleaders, and monetary funds for various other programs. Recorded here are RWC hours to supervise and fund this this program. *Volunteer Hours 175 In-kind \$2000*

Florentine Evening Club (MS) members provided a grant for the City Parks Department of Florence to purchase a new scoreboard for Hemphill Park for the sports field. *Volunteer Hours 5 In-kind \$3600*

Crime Prevention, Safety, Disaster Preparedness

"Hydrate the Firemen" is a project created by **GFWC-MFWC Women's Club of Gulfport** (MS) several years ago. Gulfport Fire Department has a specially equipped firetruck that responds to all fires in the City of Gulfport. The truck is equipped to meet the medical needs of firefighters while fighting a blaze. The city does not, however, provide hydration and nourishment, this is the responsibility of each firefighter. WCG partners with Gulfport Fire Department to stock this Special Response Truck with bottled water, Gator Aid, and nutritional bars to help with hydration and energy while protecting life and property. All proceeds from our Bunco game nights are dedicated to serving our firefighters. Three years ago. With success of Bunco game nights. We had surplus funds in our firefighters' funds. WCG members voted to use the surplus funds to provide food for seven fire stations in Gulfport at Thanksgiving. Members shopped and delivered turkeys, ingredients for cornbread dressing, vegetables, rolls and ready-made pies and cakes to each fire station the week prior for them to cook Thanksgiving Day. *Volunteer Hours 40 In-kind \$1056*

Crime Prevention, Safety, Disaster Preparedness

On May 15th, in honor of Police Appreciation Week, members of GFWC-MFWC **Batesville Woman's Club** (MS) showed gratitude to Batesville Police Department officers with breakfast bars, energy bars, chips and dips, cupcakes, cookies, various sodas and other treats for their break room. The officers generously gave their time to meet with us and were very appreciative of the treats that they could "grab and go". The club prepared a sign on green poster board to match the green serving dishes we brought for treats; the sign stated that other towns are "green with envy" that they do not have the wonderful officers and staff we have in Batesville Police Department. *Volunteer Hours 10 In-kind \$150*

The **GFWC-MFWC Decatur Woman's Progressive Club** (MS) donated yellow box money to Decatur Police Department for upgrading their service equipment. The executive staff organized and fed full meals to DPD, NCSD, and DFD. Numerous baked goods, sandwiches, and drinks were donated often. Law enforcement signs were purchased and placed in member's yard. Paper goods and volunteer work was also supplied to the Sheriff Department. *Volunteer Hours 92 In-kind \$1495*

Needy, Hungry, and Homeless

The **GFWC-MFWC Decatur Woman's Progressive Club** (MS), Mission Contribution/ Work Team helped within the community by purchasing and filling buckets of hope, flood buckets, and cleaning buckets for tornado victims. The Team helped move an elderly lady's things into a storage shed, made donations to Focus on the Family and to the Marlee Savell St. Jude Fund. Members purchased Christmas gifts for local school children, gave to the Baptist Children's Home and the Methodist Children's Home. Assisted in many ways with a local family who lost a daughter to domestic violence. Helped paint and repair floors for elderly neighbor. They were present wherever a need arose in their community. *Volunteer Hours 103 In-kind \$10345*

GFWC-MFWC Pontotoc Woman's Club (MS) packed Operation Christmas Child boxes with hygiene, educational items, clothes, and toys. The club donated 22 t-shirts for additional church boxes. Members donated \$1054 for OCC purchasing and shipping cost and volunteered 57 hours shopping. counting. packing. and working during OCC national and world-wide collection week. *Volunteer Hours 57 In-kind \$1054*

GFWC-MFWC Civic Woman's Club of Picayune (MS) project Hunger and Food Insecurity donated food items to Christian Care Ministers and Manna Ministers food ban: contributed to the Rotary Club canned food drive: donated to the Salvation Army Thanksgiving Dinner. Packaged bags of snacks to distribute to homeless. Purchased supplies and assembled red beans/rice/Vienna sausage meals for church pantry. *Volunteer Hours 42 In-kind \$1667*



Our Military Personnel and Veterans

GFWC-MFWC Lanier Club (MS) along with the City of Okolona and Carnegie Library promoted "Wreaths Across America." 285 wreaths were sold in honor or in memory of a veteran. Club members, their spouses, family, and friends, along with City officials and employees, Carnegie Library employees laid wreaths on all 255 veterans' graves designated in Okolona's Oddfellow Cemetery. Thereafter, a ceremony was held on the third Saturday of December at 11:00 a.m. sharp in conjunction with "Wreaths Across America" ceremonies across the nation, including at Arlington National Cemetery. The ceremony recognizes all veterans representing all branches of the U.S. military including those in attendance. One local military personnel presented wreaths in honor each military branch and one in honor of Prisoners of War and Missing in Action. Patriotic music including the military Medley "River Dreams" was played. Preceding the ceremony, the names of the veteran who a wreath was purchased in honor or in memory was printed in the Okolona Messenger for 11 weeks. Additionally, in preparation of this event, in addition to selling wreaths, all graves were physically marked with flags to indicate a veteran. The ceremony was advertised. All time and expense in preparation of the ceremony were donated. Approximately six weeks after the laying of wreaths, the wreaths are taken up by club members and volunteers and disposed of by the City of Okolona. GFWC-MFWC Cosmopolitan Club of Petal (MS) inspired by the upcoming "Miles of Flags on Main Street" Civic Engagement and Outreach project, a member rallied her subdivision and the adjoining subdivision to sponsor an "Ole Glory" campaign for Independence Day. She collected \$20 from each resident and bought American flags. Her group then installed brackets on all utility poles and put up 200 flags. It has been such a privilege to serve as the chairman for the GFWC Signature Program for the past four years. I cannot believe we are at the end of this administration's time already. The clubwomen of MFWC have been instrumental in distributing 100,000 items in 2021 for I Support the Girls. Since we joined forces with ISTG, our MFWC clubwomen have helped collect and deliver over 250,000 items to shelters, services, and schools across the state! Because of the miles traveled, the boxes packed, the bras collected, the pads bought, and the tampons donated, so many women and girls have been affected. Across the state, our clubs have donated to domestic violence shelters, collected pajamas for survivors, painted their towns purple, and so much more! In our general clubs, there were 419 members that participated in 96 projects. They logged 5,162 volunteer hours and donated \$5,192. There were more than \$9,000 in in-kind donations collected. We also had 3 Juniorette clubs that had 65 members participate in 17 projects, logging 209 hours!

As many of you know, April is Child Abuse Awareness Month, but did you know that April is also Sexual Assault Awareness month? Get your club members together and plan an event for that month! Put a collection bin at a local business and publicize that you are collecting donations for shelters in MS. Host a booth at a community event to spread awareness! Make hygiene packs for a local school. Contact foster services in your area and see what their needs are, and then help fill them!

- Check out the MPB Foundation which advances MPB's mission through private donor and member support. Document individual member's contributions.





Ten Ways on How to be a Library Activist!

- 1. Be informed. Get information on the issues. Be sure to read Mississippi Library Commission's On the Same Page e-newsletter to stay informed about things going on.
- 2. Learn the names of the Mississippi Senator and Representative who serve your district and our United States Senators and Representatives.
- 3. Put elected officials on your mailing lists and ask to be put on theirs. Mutual awareness of what each other cares about is essential to building a solid relationship.
- 4. Share your success stories. Ask elected officials to distribute materials about your club programs and activities at their office. Most elected officials will have a place in their offices for information about the districts they represent. Allow these people to be active in helping to promote your library.
- 5. Email a photograph to your elected officials if they attend one of your club programs held at your local library. Visual reminders help reinforce their awareness of your support for libraries especially if the picture is of them at one of your events.
- 6. Say thank you a lot! If you don't have time to write, make a call. Never let the elected official forget you are out there.
- 7. Create visibility for your elected officials. Explore creative options to get positive exposure in their district through your library. Provide them with opportunities at your public events. Invite them to talk to your club about the importance of your library to the community. This will force their staff to research our organization and get to know MFWC better.
- 8. Act regularly and promptly. Don't wait for someone else to take care of the issues. Commit to doing what you can do, no matter how small it may seem. Start believing that a single voice can make a difference.
- 9. Activate advocacy. Find others to join you in delivering your message.
- 10. Don't be afraid to ask them for their support! They work for YOU!
